CALL TO ORDER

Chair Ryan Campbell called the meeting of October 13, 2021 to order at 1:03 p.m.

PUBLIC FORUM

Chair Campbell asked if anyone in the audience wished to address the committee during this portion of the meeting to speak on any issue not on the agenda.

Jason Revord from 1pileatatime brought up the issue of shopping carts found in streams and creeks during their cleanup projects and if the county could help enforce businesses to install mechanisms which don't allow the carts to leave the store's property. Mr. Revord states that the stores don't want the carts back when they have tried to return them, leaving 1pileatatime having to dispose of them. Supervisor Campbell stated that the carts belong to those stores and it is their responsibility to dispose of them.

Mr. Revord also spoke about the "dump cams" Supervisor Brandon had requested the Board of Supervisors to authorize the purchase of "dump cams" to be utilized by 1pileatatime at their last meeting on Tuesday, October 12th. The Board opted to not approve request until further discussion with the Solid Waste Committee, the Tuolumne County Sheriff's and District Attorney's offices. Mr. Revord described the cameras and their abilities; and is convinced this is a reasonable option to curb the illegal dumping problem in Tuolumne County. He stated that some private property owners who have had problems with people illegally dumping garbage on their property have purchased some of these cameras to try and resolve this problem. Jim McHargue asks for an all-inclusive price for each camera and Mr. Revord responded that the camera's cost is anywhere from \$399 to \$450 for each unit.

Mr. McHargue states that this item will formally be placed on the agenda for the next Solid Waste Committee meeting scheduled for November 10th. The Sheriff and the District Attorney will be invited to the 11/10/2021 meeting to provide input on utilizing cameras for illegal dumping.

Mike Lagomarsino, Public Works Department for the City of Sonora, states that they are receiving a lot of complaints regarding trash receptacles on sidewalks, blocking walkways, driveways, and parking spaces. The City is asking for input on this issue and any suggestions on remedying the problem.

Vanessa Barberis, with Waste Management stated that she was aware of the issue and had spoken with both Gary Rhodes and Michelle with the City of Sonora and suggested possibly switching to carts instead of dumpsters so that they can be maneuvered much more easily and possibly building an enclosure area designated only for garbage and recycle dumpsters.

Diane Green mentioned that when walking she has seen this issue as well and suggested that the City of Sonora build a gated area in which owners will have a key to access their garbage and recycle bins.

Jason Revord from 1pileatime reported that 25 yds of debris, as part of The County program with 1pileatime was cleaned up from the homeless encampments across from the Law and Justice Center. He is working on cleaning up under the bridges across from the fairgrounds before the rain falls. Sullivan Creek Bridge itself has about 80 yds of debris including mattresses and dressers. Kim MacFarlane, Director of Public Works, would like to investigate the property lines of these locations because they may belong to Caltrans or Railroad.

Trisha Revord, from 1pileatime, asked for clarification of her charges at the Sonora Transfer Station when she brings in furniture. Trisha states that bulky items they bring to the Transfer Station are being charged for the tonnage of the item and a fee for the item.

Vanessa Barberis with Waste Management stated she had previously spoken with Jason from 1pileatime before and had asked for copies of the invoices so that she can verify on her end exactly what is being charged.

COMMITTEE BUSINESS

A. Consideration of the Minutes of the meeting of September 8, 2021.

It was moved by Councilman Garaventa and seconded by Vice-Chair David Goldemberg to approve the Minutes of September 8, 2021 as presented.

Motion carried 3 – 0 – 0 - 0

B. Staff Reports

Mr. McHargue provided an update on illegal dumping and cleanup projects throughout the county.

Mark Dyken of Resiliency Village explained further regarding the illegal dumping at his location specifically. He stated that after going through the garbage he was able to find a name and address and reached out to the resident who stated that they hired a man to dispose of garbage from their property. Mr. Dyken stated that this gentleman could only provide a disposal ticket back in July, so it appears that he is collecting garbage from

residents, receiving payment for hauling it to the transfer station, but in reality he is illegally dumping the debris on private property. Mark would like to make an example of this gentleman and see if the County will pursue legal action.

Mr. McHargue asked Larry Sweetser of Sweetser & Associates to comment regarding the issue of illegal dumping on a statewide perspective. Larry stated that he is also the Chairman of the Statewide Illegal Dumping Technical Advisory, and he can assure us that illegal dumping is a huge problem for the rural counties in California. One of the steps that they are taking is to educate law enforcement, district attorney's and code enforcement officers on how to go about gathering evidence and prosecuting those who are illegally dumping.

Mr. McHargue provided an update on the recruitment for two at-large public members to serve on the Solid Waste Committee. Currently, we have a total of four applications. One is for Alyssa Hartwig who is attending the meeting today via zoom, she submitted her application back in April 2021 and Jim will be reviewing all applications and the matter will be returned to the next Solid Waste Committee meeting. Jim thanked everyone for being patient with the application process.

Mr. McHargue addressed an item from the previous meeting regarding Tuolumne County transfer stations being one of the most expensive counties for disposal rates. Mr. McHargue provided findings from a survey of the transfer station disposal rates in our area for comparison. Tuolumne County is found to be on the lower half regarding fees.

Mr. McHargue also talks about the Cal Sierra / Waste Management Inc. 10-year contract extension, he stated that he and Ms. Barberis are working closely on this issue and should be hearing back from the Tuolumne County Counsel in the next couple of days. Jim stated they will be finalizing the document and bringing it back to the Solid Waste Committee and then ultimately to the Board of Supervisors for approval.

NEW ITEMS

- A. *Consideration and possible approval of the draft SB 1383 Organics Waste Reduction resolution requesting the rural exemption for Counties less than 70,000 population.*

Mr. McHargue provided a copy of a draft exemption resolution provided by RCRC's Environmental Services Joint Powers Authority. The resolution is a requirement for the exemption of collecting organic waste and needs to be completed prior to January 1, 2022. The goal is to get approval from the Solid Waste Committee then it can be taken to the Board of Supervisors for approval. Once approved by the Board it will be sent to CalRecycle. This will provide Tuolumne County exemption from the requirement to collect organic waste through January 31, 2026.

Chairman Campbell asked for clarification of the exemption. Mr. McHargue stated that this exemption is just for the collection of all organic waste and that Tuolumne County will still be expected to comply with the other aspects of SB 1383. Mr. McHargue stated that he will bring an ordinance to the Solid Waste Committee that will state exactly how Tuolumne County will comply with the other aspects of SB 1383 such as edible food recovery, procurement and educational outreach.

Chair Ryan Campbell asked if there was any public comment at this time. None noted.

It was moved by Councilman Garaventa and seconded by Vice-Chair David Goldemberg

Chair Campbell called for the vote: Ayes 3; Noes 0; abstain 0

B. Consideration and possible approval of the Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan (CIWMP) Five Year Review and authorization of the letter from the Solid Waste Committee/ Local Task Force to County Administrative Officer.

Mr. McHargue introduced Larry Sweetser of Sweetser & Associates to provide the Solid Waste Committee with some background on The Countywide Integrated Waste Management Plan (CIWMP).

Mr. Sweetser explained that every jurisdiction had an integrated waste management plan also known as AB 939 Plan that consisted of several components such as Summary Plan, Siting Element, Source Reduction and Recycling Element, Household Hazardous Waste Element and Non- Disposal Facility Element. Mr. Sweetser also stated that every year the Solid Waste Division is required to submit an Electronic Annual Report (EAR) to CalRecycle on behalf of both the County of Tuolumne and the City of Sonora. After a review of the CIWMP, Mr. Sweetser advises that revisions to the CIWMP are not needed due to the EAR being able to capture any changes over the years.

Discussion between Mr. Sweetser, Vice-Chair Goldberg and Chair Campbell continued regarding the manufacturers stepping up and taking on more responsibility for the disposal of their packaging instead of leaving it up to the consumer.

Chair Campbell asked if there was any public comment. None noted. At this time Chair Campbell wanted to add a side note and stated that this was a good example of how smaller counties struggle because we are still required to meet all the requirements as larger counties with not enough staff.

It was moved by Vice-Chair David Goldemberg and seconded by Councilman Garaventa.

Chair Campbell called for the vote: Ayes 3; Noes 0; abstain 0

Chair Campbell suggested for the next meeting we add **REPORTS** as an agenda item.

Chairman Campbell also suggested we invite Sam Sherman from CalTrans to our next Solid Waste Meeting. He has been hired for the Clean California Program designed to clean up homeless encampments and trash on the state highways of California.

ADJOURNMENT

Chair Campbell asked if anyone had anything further comment.

Seeing none, Chair Campbell adjourned the meeting at 2:20 p.m.

**FINDINGS OF THE SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE/LOCAL TASK FORCE
AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS
OF THE SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE/LOCAL TASK FORCE
FOR THE PERIOD NOVEMBER 10, 2021-DECEMBER 9, 2021
PURSUANT TO THE RALPH M. BROWN ACT.**

WHEREAS, all meetings of SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE/LOCAL TASK FORCE and its legislative bodies are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code §§ 54950 – 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and view the legislative bodies conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions and requirements; and

WHEREAS, a required condition of Government Code section 54953(e) is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558(b); and

WHEREAS, a further required condition of Government Code section 54953(e) is that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, the legislative body holds a meeting to determine or has determined by a majority vote that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom issued a Proclamation of a State of Emergency declaring a state of emergency exists in California due to the threat of COVID-19, pursuant to the California Emergency Services Act (Government Code section 8625); and,

1 **WHEREAS**, on June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-07-21, which
2 formally rescinded the Stay-at-Home Order (Executive Order N-33-20), as well as the framework for a
3 gradual, risk-based reopening of the economy (Executive Order N-60-20, issued on May 4, 2020) but did
4 not rescind the proclaimed state of emergency; and,

5 **WHEREAS**, on June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom also issued Executive Order N-08-21, which set
6 expiration dates for certain paragraphs of the State of Emergency Proclamation dated March 4, 2020 and
7 other Executive Orders but did not rescind the proclaimed state of emergency; and,

8 **WHEREAS**, as of the date of this Findings, neither the Governor nor the state Legislature have
9 exercised their respective powers pursuant to Government Code section 8629 to lift the state of emergency
10 either by proclamation or by concurrent Findings the state Legislature; and,

11 **WHEREAS**, the California Department of Industrial Relations has issued regulations related to
12 COVID-19 Prevention for employees and places of employment. Title 8 of the California Code of
13 Regulations, Section 3205(5)(D) specifically recommends physical (social) distancing as one of the
14 measures to decrease the spread of COVID-19 based on the fact that particles containing the virus can travel
15 more than six feet, especially indoors; and,

16 **WHEREAS**, the SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE/LOCAL TASK FORCE finds that state or local
17 officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, based on the California
18 Department of Industrial Relations' issuance of regulations related to COVID-19 Prevention through Title
19 8 of the California Code of Regulations, Section 3205(5)(D); and,

20 **WHEREAS**, as a consequence, the SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE/LOCAL TASK FORCE does
21 hereby find that it shall conduct its meetings by teleconferencing without compliance with Government
22 Code section 54953 (b)(3), pursuant to Section 54953(e), and that such legislative bodies shall comply with
23 the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed by Government Code
24 section 54953(e)(2).

 13 purpose of these Findings including, conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government
 14 Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

15 Section 4. Effective Date. These Findings shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and
 16 shall be effective until the earlier of (i) December 9, 2021, or (ii) such time the SOLID WASTE
 17 COMMITTEE/LOCAL TASK FORCE adopts a subsequent Findings in accordance with Government
 18 Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which its legislative bodies may continue to
 19 teleconference without compliance with Section 54953(b)(3).

To the Board,

A priority of this board has been challenging issues affecting community health and safety.

We have made unprecedented progress: tripling enforcement capacity, an abatement trust fund, new fee software, stronger codes, and new local non-profit partnerships cleaning up *literally tons* of garbage, plus staff's work to facilitate these and regular duties in challenging times.

However, there is a gap in *detering* these actions in the first place because codes are only effective if someone is caught. From 2018-2020, fines related to illegal disposals totaled \$0 under the 2020-2021 Budget ("Solid Waste Compliance Fund Summary"). Fines for "litter" were \$287, \$269, and \$41 respectively for the same years ("General Fund Miscellaneous").¹ While we may not expect full cost recovery, strong financial penalties provide real-world risk.

The unfortunate truth is that dumping and littering are too easy and low-risk in many areas of Tuolumne County, and while a portion of this is attributable to illegal encampments, local folks of means are doing so as well. Ask the volunteers braving it week after week — even dirt-clean areas begin accumulating garbage again within months. Cleaned areas such as Mt. Provo, Tuolumne Road, Big Hill, the Junction Shopping Center, Buchanan Mine Road, 108 and Stockton Road Underpass, East Sonora Burger King, Lime Kiln Road, Yankee Hill Road, and many more.

The cost to clean up these sites is high, and the cost to *not* clean up these sites is far higher. It quickly goes from land to our waterways, spreading trash and potentially toxic materials to soil, groundwater, streams, and reservoirs such as Don Pedro. It also impacts local business, recreation sites, and tourism revenues.

We need to deter it at the source and address this enforcement gap. We need to give our officers, deputies, and district attorneys the tools and high-quality evidence to take action. We need these folks to think twice about trashing Tuolumne County and the consequences for it.

Today, I am presenting three options for the Board to consider on establishing an innovative pilot project for “dump cams” — high-quality self-contained video units able to be setup discreetly and monitored remotely to be used by local nonprofits for gathering evidence needed to catch and punish offenders. The selection of these items was made with recommendations by #1PileAtATime. It is recommended (although not necessary) that this be a capital purchase of equipment that the county shall nominally lease for use by #1PileAtATime or other similar non-profit trash cleanup organizations.

Three options are presented to the Board for this item:

- Option 1: Approve the "Dump Cam" pilot project and the cost proposal in Appendix A from either the abatement trust fund, remaining ARPA funds, or fund balance, and direct staff to develop guidelines for use.
 - This option would require a 4/5th Vote of approval by the Board.
 - If approved the Board would also need to authorize an to increase appropriations in by \$10,125 in account 0001-207100-528110 (Special Department Expense).
 - If the Board decides to utilize General Fund contingencies, then account 0001-101200-691110 would need to be reduced by a like amount.
 - If ARPA Contingences are used, then the following actions would need to be taken
 - Reduce 1165-110997-691110 (appropriations for Contingencies) by \$10,125
 - Increase 1165-110997-641001 (operating transfer out GF) by \$10,125
 - Increase 0001-207100-495165 (Transfer in American Rescue Plan) by \$10,125.
- Option 2: Approve an amended version of the “Dump Cam” proposal.
- Option 3: Direct staff to take time and put together a proposal for future consideration.
- Option 4: Take no action.

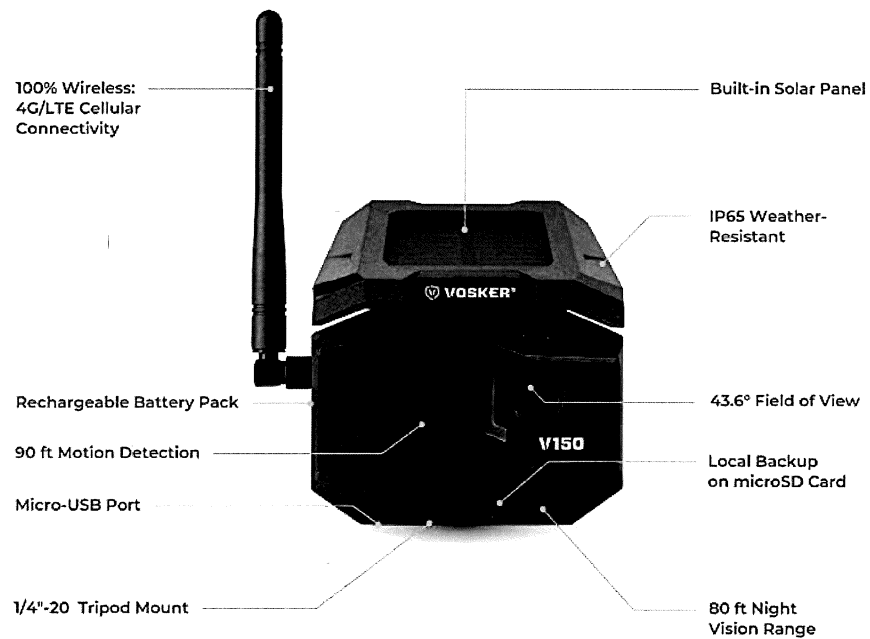

 - "7.30.020 Illegal and unauthorized dumping. A. Solid waste shall be managed to protect public health and the environment and in accordance with Titles 7 and 8 of this code. It is unlawful to

dispose of solid waste outside the Solid Waste System and any such action shall be considered "illegal dumping." Any person who:

- . . .
 - 2. Causes, maintains or permits solid waste to be deposited within the County in any manner that violates the provisions of this Chapter;
 - 3. Causes or permits the deposit of solid waste on the right-of-way of any public highway, street, easement or thoroughfare, or upon any camping place or public grounds, or on any premises, or in any waste container, without the permission of the owner thereof, or into any stream or dry watercourse, within the County of Tuolumne, State of California, and outside of any incorporated city; or
 - 4. Causes, maintains or permits the accumulation of solid waste which creates an unsanitary condition or permits or encourages the accumulation or breeding of vectors as determined by the Health Officer, or causes, maintains or permits solid waste to be placed in a waste container other than provided in this code;
 - A. is guilty of a misdemeanor and may be punished as provided in Chapter 1.08 of this code. Such person is also subject to the administrative/abatement procedures set forth in Chapter 1.10 of this code, as well as any other remedy provided by law.
 - B. Any condition which is a direct result of any of the acts/omissions set forth in Subsection A of this Section is hereby deemed to be a public nuisance subject to the administrative/abatement procedures set forth in Chapter 1.10 of this code, as well as any other remedy provided by law. (Ord. 3003 § 1, 2008). “
- Tuolumne County Ordinance Chapter 8.05 on Refuse, Rubbish, and Recyclables Storage and Handling
 - “8.05.010 Purpose. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Tuolumne hereby finds and declares that the accumulations of garbage and refuse creates a public health hazard and that the accumulation of garbage, refuse, rubbish, and recyclables creates a condition tending to reduce the value of private property, promotes blight and deterioration, invites plundering, creates fire hazards, constitutes an attractive nuisance creating a hazard to the health and safety, creates harborage for rodents and insects and can be injurious to the health, safety and general welfare.”
